

From the Vicarage.

My last letter from the vicarage was written in the aftermath of earthquakes, a tsunami and the leakage of a damaged nuclear power station. With all these ongoing problems in the world, the news is now full of political unrest, violence and retribution. At the same time we have experienced the new hope and promise of Easter, a Royal Wedding, a great weekend of community centred events and a wedding gown festival to raise funds for much needed work on our parish church.

It is quite a bizaare world in which we live. Troubled by the realities around us, and without forgetting the troubles in the world, we still manage to hold onto the good and get on with life as best we can.

It seems to me that there are two ways of looking at this world. As an optician by profession, I could say it almost depends on which pair of specs you wear.

There are those rose coloured specs - they reveal humanity at its best; kind, compassionate, charitable. We are aware of those strengths; we see them on a daily personal level. We recognise such goodness at work in world issues too.

On the other hand, through the lens of cold realism, we see the cruel hardness of human nature, and again it confronts us every day, on personal levels, as well as in the world at large; malicious cruelty, abuse, hatred dissension, division, warfare. All fruit of the same tree, and so destructive.

And when we look at the natural world what do we see? Through one pair of specs, a beautiful creation so wonderfully ordered, reflecting the wonderful God who created it. Or we can see a very different picture. A creation where there is death and decay, pain and suffering, and a world which is being systematically raped and plundered by the human race, creating pollution and disaster.

With that view of things, it is easy to conclude that mankind is hell bent on destruction. If we fail to destroy it all by bombs and hatred, we will eventually destroy it through greed and folly.

Through which lens does God view the world? Looking at the sad reality of today, does he still feel the grief and the pain he felt when in the days of Noah he wanted to cleanse the whole world and nearly threw in the towel on all his work.

How often do we feel like that? How often do we despair at the behaviour and attitudes that confront us and feel like throwing the towel in?

But God didn't! And God will never do that. The Easter message reminds us that he found another way. Love conquers despair, but only when it is fully and freely given. I am the good shepherd, and I lay down my life for the sheep.

We cannot be blind to the harsh reality of the human condition around us and within us. But we need always to see with equal clarity the enduring faithful love of God, reflected in his world, freely given to us by the good shepherd himself, and demonstrated still in the lives of those who have chosen to live in the light of his love.


CHILDRENS WELCOME CLUB


